## **Head Teacher News**

A Happy New Year to you all—I hope you all enjoyed your break.

It was lovely to welcome the children back into school again and settle them in for this next term. On the back of this newsletter are the dates for your diary for the Spring Term. This will hopefully help you organise your time, children and everything else!

A few parents have asked about what happens to the money we raise at school, please see a break down below. When staff send letters out for trips and visits they always include a breakdown of costs. How much the trip costs overall, how much the school contributes and how much we are asking you, as parents and carers to contribute to enable the trip to go ahead. Sadly, school does not have sufficient funds to pay for all trips and visits but does seek to try and keep costs down wherever possible. Without the vast majority of parents paying the trips cannot happen.

Last term we had a few class trips and visits all subsidised by school:

Magician show for EYFS cost £195—after parental contributions made a loss of £156.00

Panto KS1 & KS2 £4260.90—after parental contributions made a loss of £134.38

Father Christmas photos raised £835.00— minus school items, photo paper / selection boxes / books for all children / back drop scene, raised a total of £91.61

Christmas Raffles from donations of bottles, chocolate and Manchester United Foundation raised £483.00 Christmas singalongs raised £124

Year 6 trip to Lark Hill cost £471.00 with £200 subsidy from school, with parental contributions made a loss of £8.07

PJ and Movie night raised £532.25 with £200 going to charity and £120.61 costs for the tuck shop, raised £211.64 for school funds.

Total raised for school funds so far has been £910.25. This money goes directly into the school funds and is used to heavily subsidise school trips and visits as well as buy resources for the children e.g. costumes, the school stage.

At Clifton we also believe that it is really important that our children understand the need to support charities both near and further afield. Therefore, sometimes we ask for donations for Harvest Festival, Non-uniform day for Red Nose day or MacMillan Coffee morning etc. This money goes directly to those charities. We really appreciate your ongoing support for these charities. This year the school council has chosen to support MacDonald House (to which we have donated £200 so far) as one of our children had been extensively cared for there. Other charities include:

Macmillan Coffee morning raised £310.40 for MacMillan cancer support.

The Harvest Festival collected over 30 bags of food divided between the Loaves and Fishes Charity and St Anne's church—both of whom run food banks.

The Poppy Appeal raised £224.09

Children in Need non-uniform day raised 165.05


Save the Children via Christmas Jumper day raised £150.80.


Book fair raised £725.00 - all of which was spent on books for the different reading corners in the classrooms in school.
